

Letter from Carolyn

Dear Friends,

Most of you will have heard by now that Mark and I had the joy of becoming grandparents on 20 May when our daughter, Jo, gave birth to little Arianna. It has been a profound and emotional time and has made me think a lot about the miracle of life and family. She was born in Manchester two days before the dreadful terrorist attack in the city and it made me reflect on the kind of world in which she will be growing up and the legacy she will inherit.

I wonder what kind of legacy you want to leave for your children and grandchildren and those in our church? Does it involve just leaving them some money in your will or a functioning (and warm!) church building or does it go deeper than that? Even if we don't have much to leave materially we will still leave a legacy of some kind to the next generation after we have left this earth whether we intend to or not.

Will we leave anything that has relevance and benefit for this life and eternity? The most valuable legacy we can pass to our children, grandchildren, and other children in our lives is a spiritual legacy – the legacy of faith in Christ.

Even though each of us must make their own decision to follow Jesus, there are some things we can do to help create an atmosphere where faith can grow and thrive. When children grow up seeing the power and reality of God at work in the lives of their parents, grandparents and church family, it is not so easy for them to turn away from God in their adult lives, even if they have a rocky patch along the way!

In Psalm 78 we read the following: "My people, hear my teaching; listen to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth with a parable; I will utter hidden things, things from of old - things we have heard and known, things our ancestors have told us. We will not hide them from their descendants; we will tell the next generation the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord, His power, and the wonders He has done. He decreed statutes for Jacob and established the law in Israel, which He commanded our ancestors to teach their



children, so the next generation would know them, even the children yet to be born, and they in turn would tell their children. Then they would put their trust in God and would not forget His deeds but would keep His commands."

What can we do to leave a spiritual legacy and encourage a relationship with God in the lives of our own children and grandchildren, as well as the children and those young in the faith in our church? Here are a few suggestions:

Look at your own life The best way to prove to our children the value and relevance of faith in Christ is to be a living demonstration of that truth. Children learn more from watching us than they do from what we say. If our children see that our walk doesn't match our talk, behaving and speaking in one way at church but living and speaking differently at home or work, they will see through our lack of integrity and perceive that Jesus doesn't make a real difference in our lives. What does your child observe about your attitudes to others, the things you watch or read, the websites you visit, the language you use, the way you react when something goes wrong or when someone annoys you? Try to live out your faith in an authentic and relevant way. Let them see that even though you make mistakes and life gets messy that you can overcome these difficulties with God's help.

Share God's Word From a young age we can teach our children and grandchildren to know and love God's Word in an intentional way. Children's activities and programmes at church are wonderful but the first place a child learns about God's word is in the home with their families. Let them see you reading and studying God's word regularly, have family devotions, read Bible stories at bedtime, play worship music that comes straight from Scripture, let them see the relevance of God's word in your everyday lives and they will grow to love God's word and value its importance.

Pray with them and share answers to prayer Don't just turn prayer into a shopping list at bedtime but ask them what they would like God's help with and pray together about those things. When our girls were little we used to pray with them when there were difficulties or when one of us was ill and then they could always see the reality of God as He answered those prayers so they knew that He could be relied upon.

Value the church I know of parents whose children have heard them speaking critically about people at the church and their church leadership and then been surprised when they have grown up not wanting anything to do with the church. I have also known parents who have allowed other priorities to take the place of worship such as sports and other leisure activities and then wondered why worship is not a priority to them as they grow older and been



disappointed that their grown up children don't remain in the church. Make sure your children and grandchildren understand that the church, though far from perfect and made of all kinds of people, is the family of God and that they appreciate the importance and priority of meeting together in worship and fellowship.

Be outward looking Allow your children to see you being generous with your time, money, home and resources. Encourage them to value all people and to treat people with compassion, kindness and mercy just as Jesus did. Find ways of helping others and try to engage with your community as well as teaching them to have a global view of the world.

Look to the future Teach the children that God has a good plan for their lives and encourage them to seek God's will for their future jobs, marriage partners, homes and families. Since our girls were born we have prayed for them to find a mighty man of God to marry and are very thankful that they have both married lovely Christian men. Help them so see that the goal of life for a Christian is to walk in obedience to the Lord rather than be dragged along by the goals that the world says is important.

Parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, teachers and friends: you **will** impact the next generation. What kind of legacy will you leave? God's greatest gift to us is our families. Let each of us make sure we have continued or begun a legacy of faithfulness for our children and grandchildren.

A good number of the Congregation make their regular offering via the Gift Aid Scheme. For every £1 that is given under the Scheme, 25 pence can be reclaimed from HMRC. Therefore, the tax reclaim money received is of great help to the work of IMC and I would like to thank all those of you who are able to participate in the Gift Aid Scheme.

If you have completed a Gift Aid Declaration, please can I remind you that you **must** pay Income Tax and/or Capital Gains Tax. You need to ensure

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that the relevant tax paid by you in the tax year is equal to or greater than 25% of your Gift Aid donations made to **all** charities. If the tax is less, HMRC will ask you to pay the difference.

If you are no longer a tax payer, or no longer wish to make your offering through the Gift Aid Scheme, or there has been a change in your circumstances, e.g. address, it would be appreciated if you could let me know so I can update the records I hold.

Mind Your Language

ព្រះជាម្ចាស់ស្រឡាញ់មនុស្សលោកខ្លាំងណាស់ ហេតុនេះហើយបាន ជាព្រះអង្គប្រទានព្រះបុត្រាតែមួយរបស់ព្រះអង្គមក ដើម្បីអោយអស់ អ្នកដែលជឿលើព្រះបុត្រា មានជីវិតអស់កល្បជានិច្ច គឺមិនអោយគេ វិនាសឡើយ។

If God called you (or when He calls you!) to take the gospel to another people group or to assist the indigenous church of that group, it would be vital for you to spend time and effort in learning their language. This would be an essential part of getting to understand their culture and being able to communicate with them in their native tongue.

What would be involved in learning the Khmer language, which in various forms is spoken by the vast majority of people in Cambodia?

Fact: Khmer is the second most widely spoken South-East Asian language (after Vietnamese). Unlike Vietnamese and Thai, it is not tonal, but some of the vowel sounds can be hard for Europeans to distinguish and some consonant combinations are excruciating tongue twisters.

- Khmer has 35 consonants, of which 33 are in current use.
- ♦ There are two ways of writing each consonant.
- ♦ There are 25 vowels that follow a consonant, each of which can have two sounds, and a further 14 independent vowels.
- ♦ 13 diacritics modify pronunciation.
- In written Khmer, spaces separate phrases, not words.
- ♦ As with English, there are regional variations in punctuation.

Please pray ...

- for expatriate Christians who have to learn Khmer, especially those who do not have a natural aptitude for language learning;
- that the Holy Spirit will bridge gaps of linguistics and understanding between those from outside Cambodia who share the gospel or teach the word of God and their Cambodian listeners;
- for the Khmer School of Language, staffed by Cambodian Christians, and its Director Ms Seng BouAddheka, which teaches the Khmer language to expatriates, particularly Christian missionaries.

You wouldn't need to cook a big meal, just be around to help make sandwiches or simple snacks and help with clearing up afterwards.





Methodists for World Mission Conference 2-4 June 2017

The theme of this year's conference at Swanwick was 'Moving People, Moving Stories' and focussed on the current situation with refugees and migrants around the world. Anne Browse (MWiB president) and myself attended on behalf of MWiB and hopefully this short report will give you just a flavour of what we experienced over the weekend and maybe encourage you to attend a future conference.

There were around 110 delegates staying over the weekend with some extra day visitors on the Saturday, representing churches from across the connexion and the world. This included some of the World Church Relationships team, returned mission partners and various people invited to speak on the issue of migrants and refugees. We also met two lovely ladies attending on behalf of Methodist Women in Ireland and shared some wonderful times of fellowship and laughter with them both.

There was a creative and interesting programme for the children in attendance and they shared with us some of what they had been doing in the final session as they retold the story of Mary, Joseph and Jesus becoming refugees in Egypt using shadow puppets.

On the Saturday and Sunday mornings we took part in a challenging Bible study led by Rev Dr Inderjit Bhogal who led us via recorded video teaching sessions on the theme of 'Sanctuary.' We learned something of his own story of migration and of the work of the 'City of Sanctuary' movement and discussed various questions in small groups. We were encouraged to think of how we can give sanctuary first of all to God by inviting Him into our lives, then some practical ideas on how we can offer sanctuary as individuals and as churches, and show hospitality to the stranger and the visitor amongst us.

We also heard from various people working with refugees and migrants and heard some harrowing and moving stories from Greece, Italy, Syria, Mexico and Palestine. We were also privileged to hear stories from a lovely group of young people from the Karen Community in Myanmar who are now living in Sheffield and they shared some of their songs and dancing during the Saturday evening. Anne and I had a go at the dancing but we're not sure we'll make



their dance troupe! A group from Zimbabwe also took part during the Saturday evening and led us in some exuberant and joyful singing.

During the Saturday afternoon there were about eight workshops on offer, two of them led by Anne and myself. Anne shared stories of her experiences in Germany and Greece and I based mine on a workshop I had attended in Houston on Biblical hospitality which generated some lively and interesting discussion. Other workshops were led by some of the visitors and speakers including Tim Annan, Youth President sharing stories of his trip to Mexico, Laura Cook from 'All We Can' speaking about forced migration in the Middle East and Africa, Katy Brookes-Duncan speaking about the charity she has helped to establish called 'People Not Borders' working with refugees in Greece and a group from the Living Stones of the Holy Land speaking about some of the current issues in Syria and Palestine. As part of that we heard a moving story from a man who was born in one of the Palestinian refugee camps which brought a personal touch to the workshop.

There were several stalls with information and products from various organisations and charities and a temptation to buy a variety of wonderful things. I came home with several new books and a Nepalese Yak blanket for a family member's birthday!

The conference closed on the Sunday with a service of Holy Communion and an exhortation to make sure that we reflect on what we have learned and seek God for a way in which we can help show the love of Jesus to displaced people in our communities, nation and across the world.

Aside from all the speakers and activities, I found it a wonderful opportunity to meet with others who share a global view of the church and to fellowship with brothers and sisters from around the world and learn more of their lives.

Next year's MWM weekend will be on the theme of 'Africa - Gospel and Culture' so that promises to be full of exciting stories and worship. It will be held at Swanwick from 1-3 June 2018 so if you haven't been to one of these conferences before, I would encourage you to come along and experience it along with me next year.

and his Mum Kirstie and Grandma Kathy.



Line 5 "He descended to the dead."



What does that mean? Where do the dead go? How can Jesus descend to the dead when He said to one of the thieves on the cross in Luke 23:43, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with Me in paradise."

Last time we established the fact that Christ physically died on the cross. He gave up His spirit (Matthew 27:50). When He did that some supernatural stuff happened, which we also need to look at to try and piece together what is going on from other Scriptures. Read Matthew 27:50-53.

Earlier in Matthew's Gospel Jesus said something about Himself which gives us a clue as to where He went in His spirit – Read Matthew 12:39-40, "...the Son of Man will be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth." He descended to the lower earthly regions. This is mind blowing stuff and might be too much for some of you to accept, but it is Christian doctrine nonetheless.

On the Day of Pentecost the Apostle Peter preached to the crowds under the anointing of the Holy Spirit. During his sermon (Acts 2:22-28) he quotes Psalm 16:8-11 where it says, "...you will not abandon me to the realm of the dead..." What and where is this realm of the dead? In the AV it says, "For thou wilt not leave my soul in hell; neither wilt thou suffer thine Holy One to see corruption."

The Hebrew word for the place of the dead is shoel, in Greek it's hades. The world of the dead - grave, hell, pit. That is where Jesus went in His spirit. His body was in the tomb, but His spirit went down into hades.

Let's look at 1 Peter 3:18-20, "... He went and made proclamation to the imprisoned spirits - those who were disobedient long ago..." After physical death the unrighteous go to a place called Hades, prior to the Judgement. Hades, is like Hell's check-in.; in the same way as paradise is Heaven's check-in. See John 5:28-29 - "...rise to live..." "...rise to be condemned..."

So why did Jesus have to descend into hades? He had to collect something that He could legally take hold of having passed through physical death. Read Revelation 1:117b-18 - "I AM the Living One; I was dead, and now look, I am alive for ever and ever! And I hold the keys of death and Hades."



Have you ever forgotten your keys? Humanity lost their keys (the key of life) when they sinned against God in the garden. They didn't die physically the day they rebelled against God, but they died in their spirits. They became bound to Satan by the curse of death. Read Romans 5:17-21 and 6:23. They became his slaves through his lies and trickery.

Without Christ people are still under the curse of spiritual death and will go into hades after the first death, awaiting the Day of Judgement, before the second or final death as per Revelation 22, but the 'Second Death' comes under line 8 of the Apostles' Creed so we're won't cover that now.

Back to the keys, which Christ won back after His decent to the place of the dead / sheol / hades. Jesus said something interesting to Peter after his confession regarding Him being the Christ in Matthew 16. Read Matthew 16:18-19. "I will give you the keys of the kingdom..." (Matthew 16:19) Keys = power and authority. Christ, after descending into the outer portals of hell and in full and total surrender to His Father's will obtained the keys of death and Hades. In other words, He has total authority of death and Hell! So that makes what Jesus is promising Peter and the Church all the more significant - "I will give you the keys of the kingdom..."

He is promising to pass on to us the authority which He has legally obtained! Hence the verses that follow in Matthew 16:19; "...whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven..." This is about the authority of Christ being passed on to the children of the Kingdom so that they can operate in the same way as He does on earth.

We use this in deliverance and healing – bind the demonic – loose the power of the Holy Spirit. All this is done in the authority of and for the glory of Jesus Christ. And this is all because: 'He descended to the dead'.

Line 6 – "On the third day He rose again."

We've just looked at where Jesus went once He'd given up His spirit. He descended to the realm of the dead. Nothing unusual up until this point. But unlike many who had gone before Him, Jesus was only a temporary visitor to Hades, and was on a mission to free mankind from the final enemy - death!

We are told in 1 Corinthians 15:26, "The last enemy to be destroyed is death." He literally conquered the grave and won back the keys of death and hell. He stormed the gates of death and overcame that final enemy!



So let's look very briefly at four points:-

The challenge of the Resurrection
The events of the Resurrection
The power of the Resurrection
The results of the Resurrection

The challenge of the Resurrection

Satan has tried ever since to play down Christ's victory. There have always been his spokesmen over the years who have denied that the resurrection ever took place.

The Apostle Paul acknowledge this in his letter to the church in Corinth. So let's read 1 Corinthians 15:12-19. "But if it is preached that Christ has been raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith. More than that, we are then found to be false witnesses about God, for we have testified about God that He raised Christ from the dead. But He did not raise Him if in fact the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised either. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ are lost. If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied."

There are still those who are in this category that Paul talks about. They are either wanting to completely debunk the Christian gospel or call themselves Christian, but cannot accept the reality of the supernatural!

The Resurrection of Christ is the battleground. If human or spiritual forces can deny or downgrade this event, they know they can undermine and invalidate the Christian church. The bodily resurrection of Jesus is non-negotiable. If it is false, we fall into a state of deception. We are fools to be pitied and there is no hope as Paul mentions. He gives a long list of woes -

Our preaching is useless

Our faith is useless
We are false witnesses
Our faith is futile
We are still in our sins
When we die we're lost
We are to be pitied if we only have hope in this life

The enemy and his disciples hate the thought and reality of the resurrection, because it means their doom!

So the usual tactic of the enemy is to make things fuzzy and not quite tangible or to cast just enough doubt on something to make us doubt too! You will recall of the devil's words to Adam in the garden and Jesus in the wilderness - "Did God say..." "If you are the Son of God..."

So objections to the resurrection are common and to be expected because it is a hinge point of true Christian belief. The devil knows it's true, hates the fact and so creates a smoke-screen of lies. Secular humanists try to explain it away. Dead or false religion downplays it, casts doubt upon it or twists it into a complex mesh of philosophical tripe.

But what does God say? We continue with 1 Corinthians 15 and verse 20 where it tells us, "But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep."

The events of the Resurrection

Jesus prophesied that this was going to happen (Matthew 16:21). It was also previously prophesied in Old Testament – Psalm 16:8-11 and Isaiah.53:10-11.

In the New Testament there are ten post-resurrection bodily appearances of Jesus:-

- To Mary Magdelene in the garden on Resurrection Sunday in Jerusalem (Mark 16:9-11 and John 20:11-18)
- To other women on Resurrection Sunday in Jerusalem (Matthew 28:9-10)
- The two on the road to Emmaus on Resurrection Sunday (Mark 16:12-13 and Luke 24:13-32)
- To Peter on Resurrection Sunday (Luke 24:34)
- To ten disciples in the upper room the following Sunday (Luke 24:36-43 and John.20:19-25)
- To seven disciples fishing some time later (John.21:1-23)
- To eleven disciples at Galilee (Matthew 28:16-20 and Mark.16:15-18)
- To more the 500 in an unknown location some time later (1 Corinthians 15:6)
- To James in an unknown location some time later (1 Corinthians 15:7)
- To His disciples at His ascension on The Mount of Olives 40 days after His resurrection (Luke.24:44-49 and Acts 1:3-8)

Read 1 Corinthians 15:1-8 "...according to the Scriptures..." To hold on to the truth we must hold on to the Scriptures.

- His own power from the Father John 10:17-18
- Jesus is the Resurrection John 11:25-26

The Result of the Resurrection

- It declares His deity Romans 1:4
- The preaching of the full Gospel Luke 24:36-48
- It disarms rulers and authorities Colossians 2:13-15
- It has given us power Romans 8:11
- It enables us to be saved Romans 10:9-10
- It has given us victory over death Romans 6:8-11
