

Letter from Carolyn

Dear Friends



As I write this article we have been living in our new home in Ivybridge for a couple of months and we feel well and truly settled in to the house and community. We want to offer our thanks to the congregation at IMC who have made us feel so welcome – we have been overwhelmed by your love – the cards, meals, flowers and good

wishes – we are truly blessed to have been allowed to live and work alongside you all at this time and are excited about all that God has in store for us as we seek to fulfil His mission in lyybridge together.

We have moved quite a few times in our married life which can be unsettling (and exhausting now we're getting older!!) but the upshot is it has made us constantly get rid of all the clutter that we would have gathered if we had stayed in one place and we now travel comparatively lightly! Hopefully all this will save our daughters a huge task one day when we pop our clogs!

Our biggest declutter was when we were moving overseas and had to cull all our belongings in order to keep the storage costs at a minimum – at that time we had the great give away and dispensed with a huge amount of our personal belongings. We shipped 10 crates out to Guyana and when we returned were not able to bring back more than we could carry so we ended up giving away all our bedding, towels, clothing and books before our return flight! So we began life in Devon in a minimalistic way(!) but amazingly over the past three and a half years seem to have accrued a whole load of new clutter! So moving to Ivybridge was another great excuse to have a clear out before and after the move.

There's something very liberating about getting rid of clutter and travelling light and I've read a lot of magazine articles and seen several books on this subject, encouraging people to move away from the acquisition of 'stuff' and live a simpler life. It's definitely true that the less you have the less there is to worry and stress about.

The same can be said of our spiritual lives. How often do we carry around emotional baggage that clutters up our lives and drags us down? I often meet Christians who are carrying around heavy loads of regret, fear, disappointment, shame, guilt, unforgiveness, anger, bitterness, anxiety, bad habits, addictions and negativity, all of which can prevent us from becoming the people that God created us to be and being effective as disciples of Jesus. Sometimes we need a bit of help with putting these burdens down and finding freedom.

With that in mind, in the new year, Mark and I are going to be running a series on some Sunday evenings called 'Freedom in Christ' based on a course we undertook a few years ago and have run several times.

This is a discipleship course 'designed to help every Christian take hold of the truth of who they are in Christ, resolve personal and spiritual conflicts through genuine repentance and move on to maturity.' When I first participated in the course I had already been a Christian for around 30 years and wished that this had been available to me many years earlier as it would have saved me carrying around my own personal baggage for so long. I would highly recommend that you try to get to as many of the sessions as possible, whether you are a new Christian or have been following Jesus for many years. Our prayer is that through this series we will all be enabled to declutter our lives and begin to travel light, reaching all the potential that God has for each one of us.



"Democracy in Cambodia is Already at Its Last Breath"

Fact:

The Cambodian government has intensified its crackdown on the opposition.



During the early hours of 3 September, Kem Sokha, the leader of the opposition Cambodia National Rescue Party (CNRP), was arrested. He was later charged with treason and with conspiring with foreigners to overthrow the Cambodian government (based on a 2013 speech in which he described wanting to bring peaceful, democratic change to Cambodia and receiving advice from American experts). In a letter posted on his Facebook page, Sokha called on the international community for help. "Democracy in Cambodia is already at its last breath," he wrote.

The Deputy President of the CNRP left Cambodia on 3 October believing her arrest to be imminent. Several of her colleagues had already fled.

The day after Sokha's arrest, Cambodian Prime Minister Hun Sen said, "Before, I was very hesitant of when I shall be leaving office, but after witnessing the treasonous acts of some Cambodians in recent days, I have decided to continue my job for another 10 years."

The government has closed down an English language newspaper that was critical of its policies and radio stations that rebroadcast the Voice of America and Radio Free Asia.

Senior Cambodian military officials have pledged "the elimination" of all foreigners deemed intent to commit aggression against the country.

Please pray:

- for peace and calm;
- for a free and fair general election in 2018 with the opportunity for reasonable debate between candidates without fear of reprisals;
- for wisdom for Cambodian Christians to know how to respond to the political situation;
- for '... all who are in authority, so that [Cambodians] may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity' (1 Timothy 2: 2);
- for my visit to Cambodia from 6 to 27 December.


Our mission to take good news relevantly to every

Line 9 -"I believe in the Holy Spirit"

This is, once again a personal statement for each believer to enjoy! In the Apostles' Creed, as opposed

to the Nicene Creed, it is personal.

We've asserted – I believe in: God, the Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth Jesus Christ, His Only Son, our Lord Now we come to the Third Person of the Holy Trinity – the Blessed Holy Spirit.

In the Nicene Creed it says quite a bit more about The Holy Spirit asserting: We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

But the Apostles' Creed simply says, "I believe in the Holy Spirit", and I too want to keep this very simple because it is by personal revelation and experience that we can get to know the Holy Spirit. However, our experience must align to the Holy Spirit inspired Holy Scriptures – otherwise there can be a tendency to go into the excesses of the flesh and/or personal spiritualities.

As we have said previously there are many different spirits, but only one Holy Spirit. Jesus said, "And I will ask the Father, and He will give you another advocate to help you and be with you for ever - the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept Him, because it neither sees Him nor knows Him. But you know Him, for He lives with you and will be in you. I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said to you." John 14:16-18 & 26

Let's pick up on a few words and phrase to help us understand what Jesus is saying here about the Holy Spirit.

Jesus asked the Father and He gave us another 'advocate' (verse 16). The Greek word here is *parakletos* meaning -

- summoned, called to one's side, especially called to one's aid;
- one who pleads another's cause before a judge, a pleader, counsel for defence, legal assistant, an advocate;
- one who pleads another's cause with one, an intercessor

Of Christ in His exaltation at God's right hand, pleading with God the Father for the pardon of our sins -

• In the widest sense, a helper, succourer, aider, assistant.

Of the Holy Spirit destined to take the place of Christ with the apostles (after His ascension to the Father),

♥ To lead them to a deeper knowledge of the gospel truth, and give them divine strength needed to enable them to undergo trials and persecutions on behalf of the divine kingdom.

"The Spirit of Truth" (verse 17). The Greek word used here for truth is $al\bar{e}theia$, the literal meaning of which is "the state of not being hidden; the state of being evident." -

Objectively

What is true in any matter under consideration

- ♥ Truly, in truth, according to truth
- Of a truth, in reality, in fact, certainly

What is true in things appertaining to God and the duties of man, moral and religious truth

- ♥ In the greatest latitude
- The true notions of God which are open to human reason without His supernatural intervention

The truth as taught in the Christian faith

- Respecting God and the execution of His purposes through Christ, and respecting the duties of man,
- Opposing alike to the superstitions of the Gentiles and the inventions of the Jews, and the corrupt opinions and precepts of false teachers even among Christians

Subjectively

- Truth as a personal excellence
- That candour of mind which is free from affection, pretence, simulation, falsehood, deceit

How we need the truth of the Holy Spirit in our lives, our families, our church, community and nation!

- To save us from pretence
- To save us from error
- ♥ To save us from deception

- ♥ To save us from human opinions
- ♥ To save us from the devil's temptations
- To save us from wasting our time and lives on things which are of no consequence

We need power! We need help! We need it now! Praise God for the Holy Spirit!

I believe in the Holy Spirit! Leading – Guidance – Gifts – Healing – Deliverance – Witnessing – Preaching – Administration – Protection

"The Holy Spirit can be our teacher" (verse 26) The Greek word for teacher is *dedasko*

To teach

- To hold discourse with others in order to instruct them, deliver didactic discourses
- To be a teacher
- To discharge the office of a teacher, conduct one's self as a teacher

To teach one

- ♥ To impart instruction
- Instil doctrine into one
- The thing taught or enjoined
- ♥ To explain or expound a thing
- ♥ To teach one something

Are we teachable? Do we want to change? Learn? Be more like our Lord Jesus?

How open to the Holy Spirit are we really?

Holy Spirit wants to teach us more, for us to go deeper, to leave the shallows and let our feet leave the safety of the surface so we have to rely more fully on Him.

This is a great promise – "But <u>YOU</u> (emphasis Holy Spirit) will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8)

Report on Methodist Council High Leigh Hoddesdon Monday 16 - Tuesday 17 October 2017



What is the Methodist Council?

It is a body of people comprising representatives from each district of the Methodist Church in Britain (MCB) as well as the national leadership team. It meets three times a year to carry out the work arising from the annual Methodist Conference and is in effect the governing body of the Methodist Church across the land (known as the Connexion – that is all the Methodist Churches in Britain are linked and form a national church model rather than a congregational model, supporting each other and working together).

I have had the privilege of being the representative of the Plymouth and Exeter District for the past two years with two more to serve. I really value your prayers for myself and the whole council as we meet to discuss really important issues regarding the life and witness of the church. Below is a summary of the key points from my perspective to give you an overview and to inform your prayers.

A few key points:

Thy Kingdom Come - The Strategy and Resources Committee have agreed that the Methodist Church in Britain should become a partner in the ecumenical call to prayer initiative, 'Thy Kingdom Come' as an important missional initiative.

Strategic use of property - A report was received approving the development of a Connexional strategy for the use of Methodist

property in Mission and Evangelism. It was suggested that all Methodist property should be demonstrably fulfilling our calling and that searching and rigorous questions are asked before buildings are sold or disposed of. Need for a district overview of the properties and a strategic way forward to enable a Christian presence in cities, towns and villages.

All We Can - The council received a report showing how the Methodist relief and development fund, All We Can, and the Methodist Church are seeking a closer working relationship and heard about discussions that have already taken place.

Statistics for Mission – Where do we go from here? Statistics nationally show that the membership of the Methodist Church continues to decline, apart from a few places that buck the trend. This was given a considerable chunk of time for discussion. The Connexional Leaders gave a presentation and we were asked to consider whether we felt we were at a crisis point and if so what we believed God is saying to us about the way forward. Do we want to change direction or are we happy to go with decline? We were encouraged to reaffirm 'Our Calling' worked out through worship, service, learning and caring and evangelism. Gareth Powell, Secretary to the Conference, said that it is 'a joyful and joy filled task to serve Jesus' and that as council we should be 'agitators for the gospel ... not professional committee goers but here because God has called us to build the body of Christ.' He also said that 'we should not be rushing into a strategy for survival but trust in God and seek to discern His purposes.'

Discussion groups - We were given a set of collated responses on the district discussions from conference to help our discussions in small groups. In my small group we had a long discussion about how we can reverse decline and shared testimonies of good news stories from around the Connexion where God is at work and the church is reaching out with the love of Jesus. We shared ideas for growth such as church planting, cell church, training in personal evangelism for church members, more commitment to prayer and seeking God, encouraging the giving of testimony to what God has done (sharing good news) in order to give people confidence in sharing small stories of faith and encourage the church, encouraging church members in their own personal faith and growth so that they have the confidence to share their faith in Jesus with others in creative and new ways. The small

group discussion points were fed back to the whole council and have been recorded for use at the next council in January.

Early morning communion service - for reflection

The Vice President, Jill Baker, preached at the communion service on the story of Jacob at Bethel (Gen 28:10-19) and Jesus in the temple (John 2:13-22). She drew the comparison between the stories of two pictures of the 'house of God'. She referred to various references to 'Bethel' in the Bible ... 1. Gen 12 Abraham ... set up as a staging post on a journey ... for some people the church is a stopping place on their journey. 2. Gen 28 Jacob, who was a liar and cheat, found a place of grace and undeserved favour ... some people need the church as a place to find grace and mercy. 3. Gen 35 The return to Bethel as a place of death and memorial ... some people need the church as a safe place at difficult times. 4. Judges ... a place of discernment where people enquired of the Lord ... some people need the church at times of uncertainty in their own lives or with world events. 5. Kings. Bethel becomes a place of idolatry – a period of shame and castigation. Then mention of Bethel disappears. Coming to John 2 Jesus comes to the house of God and doesn't meet what He hopes to meet. She invited us to reflect prayerfully on what Jesus meets now in our churches? What are our churches like?

Personal note


I was deeply encouraged by the conversations and reports discussed at council and especially hopeful about the recognition of the need to do something about the statistics for mission, the need to seek God for the future of the Methodist church and the increasing focus on the need for mission and evangelism across the land. It was agreed that a large portion of council in January will be given to discussing what we can actually DO about this rather than continue talking about it and analysing it ad infinitum.
