

A Letter from Mark

*“Now may the Lord of peace Himself
give you peace always in every way.*

The Lord be with you all.”

(2 Thessalonians 3:16 NKJV)

TAIZÉ

(Tezay)

Taizé is best known among Christians for its distinctive meditative music - one or two lines of text set to a simple tune with harmonies supplied by instruments and voices.



It originated in the village of Taizé in war-torn France in 1940, when Swiss born Brother Roger cycled into the deserted village to realize his still unfocused ideal of a religious life. He helped many Jews as they made their escape into Switzerland, but had to leave in 1942 after being denounced to the Vichy authorities. In Geneva he gathered three more brothers who shared his emerging ideal of reconciliation. They returned to Taizé in 1944 and began with offering comfort to German prisoners of war and also ran a home for children orphaned by the war.

In 1949 seven monks took a vow of celibacy and embraced a common life “where kindness of heart would be lived out very concretely, and where love would be at the heart of everything.”

By the end of the 1950’s young people had started to visit and in the early 1960’s Taizé monks began discreetly contacting and visiting Christians behind the Iron Curtain.

Many people, worried by the European Union’s lack of spiritual dimension, have been finding in Taizé what they feel is missing. There is no place here for divided Christian denominations. The only divisions are created by language, and those are usually bridged by the linguistic abilities of the monks, by patient translation, and of course by the music.

Taizé prayer is not conducted in the usual way with a prominent leader. It is led by the musicians who gently guide the proceedings from chant to chant, allowing a short time of reflection and space for prayer. A sense of gentle timelessness is essential.




Congratulations!

Gifts and Calling Update

In Autumn 2018, IMC held a series of Sunday evening sessions to provide Biblical teaching and insight on the subject of spiritual gifts and calling. Together we learnt that God intends us **all** to have a part to play in His Church and that He has wired us all in a way to get involved. How exciting and encouraging is that?



The evenings included practical activities and the series finished with a questionnaire, which helped us identify our individual gifts. These were then collected together, to see what gifts were present in the whole group, and what God might be calling us to do at IMC here in 2019. The Bible mentions specifically 28 gifts of the Spirit and we are blessed that among the 30 or so people who came to the sessions, most of the gifts could be identified.

As a follow up, each of those who attended were asked for feedback on their feelings about the course, what gifts they had identified, and any questions or clarifications they needed. The idea: to encourage us all to exercise our calling and work together as a team!

This is what some people said:

Following the teaching on three Sunday evenings, about identifying and investigating our gifts from God, the Monday afternoon Women's Group spent a few weeks looking in more detail at what the gifts are and how to consider practicing them within our church. Although some of the gift titles seem demanding and overwhelming when applied to church leaders we found there were a whole range of small ways we could extend the use of our gifts. We culminated the series by inviting Phil and Mark to join us for encouragement and better understanding which was great. Dawn

After enjoying the three sessions and being encouraged by them I duly filled in the survey, eagerly looking for what God was saying to me. The gifts that were highlighted were, (in my eyes), very ordinary - but not surprising and I think I was a bit disappointed. However as I thought, prayed and chatted to a couple of folks I realised what God was saying was, "You're doing OK, you're doing what I gifted you for". How often we seek glamorous gifts when God has given each one of us just the gifts the body of Christ needs to flourish and grow. If we spend time wishing we could do this or that, the other part of the Church's mission will not be happening.



Our gifts, however small they may be, are necessary - we just have to make sure we are using them and letting God grow them on. Val

No Limits - Becoming the people God intended us to be

It's said that everyone, at some point in their life, asks the questions, "Who am I?" "Why am I here?". Psalm 139 tells us that we are 'fearfully and wonderfully made', but sadly, outside influences and our own choices tend to mess us up and put limits on us. So we don't always act, think and feel fearfully and wonderfully! God's desire, however, is always to bless and to help us discover our true identity and purpose. This course looks at the place of healing and restoration in our Discipleship Journey and helps us to see ways of throwing off things that hinder us

KNOWING OUR HEBREW ROOTS: Clothes Make the Man?

Clothing speaks volumes about a person. It can denote identity, culture, status, role and more. “Clothes make the man”, says the ancient Greek proverb - also Shakespeare and

Mark Twain. The Bible, too, has a lot to say about clothing. In the beginning, after Adam and Eve sinned and felt compelled to cover themselves and hide, God Himself clothes them more suitably with animal skin. Although the reason for this is not explained, interesting ideas come from a Hebrew word play.

Commentators have noted the Hebrew words for “skin” and “light”, though spelled differently, sound the same. Rabbi Meir (139-163 AD), one of the great sages of his generation, says that by sinning Adam and Eve lost their covering of light and God covered them with skin.

This reading of the text is strengthened by other scriptural passages. As man was created in God’s image and God is clothed in His Shekinah glory, so it is reasoned that man was originally clothed with a shining garment of glory. *“God made mankind a little lower than the angels and crowned them with glory and majesty.”* (Psalm 8:6) It is also noted that this glory is more radiant in those who are more holy. Moses’ face shone after coming down from Mount Sinai (Exodus 34); and on the Mount of Transfiguration Jesus’ face was like lightning and His clothes like snow (Matthew 28).

Beginning in the Garden, the story of God providing clothing and restoration for mankind continued through the Bible:

“My soul shall exult in my God, for He has clothed me with the garments of salvation; covered me with the robe of righteousness.” (Isaiah 61:10)

“Put on the armour of light ... Put on the Lord Jesus Christ.” (Romans 13:12-14)

“Put off the old man ... and put on the new man.” (Ephesians 4:22)

Buy from me gold ... and white garments that you may clothe yourself.” (Revelation 3:18)

So our clothing identifies more than our status or role. It reminds us of our sinful past ... and our future glory.



"And we all, with unveiled face, beholding the glory of the Lord, are being transformed in the same image from one degree of glory to another ..." (2 Corinthians 3:18)

"I looked, and saw a great multitude ... from every nation, tribe, people and tongue ... clothed in white robes ... crying out with a loud voice, 'Salvation belongs to our God who sits upon the throne and to the Lamb.'" (Revelation 7:9-10)

I did not know

At Beit Immanuel, a Messianic Congregation in Tel Aviv Israel, just after finishing the praise and worship portion of the Friday evening service, it was announced that there would be a guest speaker ... and please do not take photos.



There was the usual hubbub of sending the children to their classes and then getting settled.

But when the congregation got a glimpse of the figure that walked into the sanctuary, it grew very quiet. (Later, some of our congregation told me that they were frightened.) A woman walked to the front of the congregation in a black burqa with just a small opening for her eyes. You could have heard a pin drop as the whole congregation froze.

A. began to tell her story:

I was born and raised in a Muslim country. The word Yehudi (Jew) was instilled in me as a bad word, a cuss word. The Yehudi should not exist ... they should be killed. I never thought to question why.

Once I was with my father as a crowd gathered and we were pushed to the front. I saw a woman tied up, sitting on a box. A man pulled out a long sword and beheaded the woman. My legs were shaking, my heart beating fast, and my father said, "If you don't listen to our teaching, this will happen to you one day."

I was a broken person. In my prayer time I lifted up my hands and cried out to Allah for help. "Please help my father stop beating my mother. Please help my father stop beating me." But no help came.

Eventually our family went to the US. There my grandmother had a heart attack, went to hospital and died. I was devastated. I lost my best friend. I was hurting so much only crying helped. A woman, Paula, asked me if I was OK, and I started to cry. Paula came to me, put her arms around me and gave me a hug. Then she said, "Would you like to go to church with me?" When I walked into this church I experienced love and acceptance from these people like I never had before.

For the first time in my life I heard a message from the Bible. It was about Yeshua, how He read from a scroll of the prophet Isaiah. "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me. He has anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor, to heal the broken heart, give sight to the blind, and to proclaim liberty to the captive."



It was the first time I heard words of freedom and healing. I was blinded with so much hatred in my heart and I was desperate to be freed.

I knew the decision to leave Islam was a big decision. But I was desperate to know a living God. The day I gave my life to becoming a follower of Jesus I said, "God, forgive me. I did not know I hated your people."

Taking off her burqa, A. said, "Now I don't need this anymore. I love the Jewish people because it is their God and their Messiah I'm following and He told me to love them This is the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and the nation of Israel is God's heartbeat. I had never heard about the Holocaust, and now I meet with Holocaust survivors. I hear their stories and I share mine with them.

Your Messiah changed my heart, He rescued me and brought joy in my life again. I'm a blessed woman." A.

More about the theme ...

Cathy: Advent occurs at the darkest time of the year; a time that I will invite us to explore as a wondrous time, a time of intimacy, care and inner sight. Together we will think about why it is that in the Christian tradition, light has come to be exalted, venerated, worshiped even, whilst darkness has become demonised and feared. How can we use the experience of darkness to lift our spirits, challenge our hearts and minds and draw us closer into the heart of God?

Steve: 'God saw the light was good and separated the light from the darkness.' Advent is a time we traditionally light candles to focus on Jesus as the Light of the World, however we cannot see light without darkness. It is the interplay of light and darkness which creates beauty and mystery, shape and texture. Photography means 'drawing with light' and the accessibility of this art form in its digital medium allows us to explore God's creation of light and darkness and see the world in new ways.

Cliff College was, historically, a Methodist Lay Training College, which now provides theological education and training with a particular focus on mission and evangelism. Set in the Derbyshire Peak District, the College has extensive grounds amidst excellent walking country and fine views.

Getting Your Money to Where It Is Needed



Cambodian Communities out of Crisis (CCC) continues to be grateful for the monthly donation we receive from Ivybridge Methodist Church. However, it seems to be getting more difficult to get the money you give to where it is needed. In April, the bank we use in Cambodia refused to deposit in our account a sum of money transferred from the UK pending the 'updating of our profile'. We praise the Lord that after we prayed the money was eventually paid in, but we are concerned about another development that could hinder us in the future.

Last December, the Senate (the upper house of the Cambodian parliament) approved a proposed new law to track the flow of money from abroad. The law would require individuals and private institutions that receive finance from abroad to be registered. It would also allow the Ministries of Finance and Interior and the National Bank of Cambodia to monitor all civil society, insurance, pension, real estate and individual transactions.

CCC has never had an official presence in Cambodia. We always believed it was safer for the church and a way of avoiding corruption, bureaucracy and wasteful expenditure if we made grants to individuals, churches and local organisations, rather than setting up ourselves as a registered non-governmental organisation there.

This new law could potentially restrict or prevent CCC from sending money into Cambodia. Or it could force us into the costly, difficult or even impossible situation of trying to register with the government.

If CCC cannot send funds to Cambodia then the reason for our existence will come to an end.

Please pray with us:

- Please ask the Lord to make His intentions for the future of CCC clear.
- Please ask Him to show us an alternative way of sending money to Cambodia if necessary.
- Stand with us in faith that the Lord has defeated all the schemes of the devil and He will provide all our needs.
- Pray for Cambodia as it edges closer to becoming a 'Big Brother' society where the government monitors everything that takes place.


