A Letter from Mark

"The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few.

Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out

workers into His harvest field."

(Matt.9:37b-38 NIV)



I recently preached on these verses, but it seems even more appropriate as we approach this harvest time of year as we celebrate God's goodness to us and His provision through the resources of this wonderful planet. By the time you read this article we would have had our special 'Earth service' on 29 September. This will be followed with our Harvest Thanksgiving service and gift day on 6 October when we are encouraged to give in to the ministry of this church fellowship to enable us to continue the work of making more disciples of Jesus, i.e. ingathering the harvest ©

When Jesus spoke the words above it was in response to the multitudes He saw that 'they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd.' (*Matt.9:36*)

People who have put their trust in the political status quo and in the natural cycles of the earth are being severely shaken at the moment. By the end of this month, we as a nation, will have left the EU. Our climate continues to rapidly change even faster than originally predicted by the scientists. As wonderful as our politicians and scientists are, and it is right to give thanks for their continued contributions, if we put our trust in them we're delusional or naïve at best!

For those of us who have taken the step of faith to put our whole trust in Jesus Christ we know that our lives are now rested and rooted in God Himself and therefore we have a deep security and peace in Him, whatever may or may not come our way. As Jesus said, "I have told you these things, so that in Me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." (John 16:33 NIV)

So what about this harvest? Well, Jesus told His disciples (and therefore us if we are His disciples) to ask the Lord of the harvest (i.e. God our Heavenly Father) to send out workers into His harvest field. Who are these workers then? Missionaries abroad? Ministers? Lay workers? Well yes in part, but actually, as you might have gathered, it's all of us! You included. If you are a member of IMC or a committed adherent then you're one of the workers!

Without workers nothing happens. In the world people can be consumers at great cost to the earth's resources and its sustainability!

However, spiritual consumerism doesn't equate with true discipleship. If people only take within the life of the church they're hindering her growth. If they only show up when they feel like it and only take what they want like popping in to the local supermarket for a few bits they're seriously missing the point of the Gospel! The church can't function if everyone did that. God is calling for us to be givers and workers not takers. Why? Because He wants to reach this needy world (the harvest field) with His love, power, grace, mercy and transformation and He wants to do His work through us – you and me. What a wonderful privilege and honour \odot

Are you a giver? What gifts and graces are you using to build up this part of the Church of Jesus Christ? What difference are you making? Do you make worship and fellowship a priority knowing it to be a wonderful privilege and blessing to others as well as to the Lord? Or is it way down your list and only fitted in after 'more important things'? O God deliver us from lukewarmness!

May God grant us a revelation of His heart for the lost. May we be open to His Holy Spirit. May we rise up in obedience, so that together we can be His workers in His harvest field gathering in those who as yet are harassed and helpless and have the wonderful privilege of introducing them to the Good Shepherd!

Leaving a Legacy for your Children

I first put this in the IMC magazine two years ago but thought that it would be good to put it in again for anyone who missed it the first time.

Mark and I had the joy of becoming grandparents on 20th May 2017 when our daughter Jo gave birth to little



Arianna. It has been a profound and emotional time and has made me think a lot about the miracle of life and family. She was born in Manchester two days before the dreadful terrorist attack in the city and it made me reflect on the kind of world in which she will be growing up and the legacy she will inherit.

I wonder what kind of legacy you want to leave for your children and grandchildren and those in our church? Does it involve just leaving them some money in your will or a functioning (and warm!) church building or does it go deeper than that? Even if we don't have much to leave materially we will still leave a legacy of some kind to the next generation after we have left this earth whether we intend to or not.

Will we leave anything that has relevance and benefit for this life and The most valuable legacy we can pass to our children, grandchildren, and other children in our lives is a spiritual legacy - the legacy of faith in Christ.

Even though each of us must make their own decision to follow Jesus, there are some things we can do to help create an atmosphere where faith can grow and thrive. When children grow up seeing the power and reality of God at work in the lives of their parents, grandparents and church family, it is not so easy for them to turn away from God in their adult lives, even if they have a rocky patch along the way!

In **Psalm 78** we read the following:

My people, hear my teaching; listen to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth with a parable; I will utter hidden things, things from of old - things we have heard and known, things our ancestors have told us. We will not hide them from their descendants; we will tell the next generation the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord, his power, and the wonders he has done. He decreed statutes for Jacob and established the law in Israel, which he commanded our ancestors to teach their children, so the next generation would know them, even the children yet to be born, and they in turn would tell their children. Then they would put their trust in God and would not forget his deeds but would keep his commands.

What can we do to leave a spiritual legacy and encourage a relationship with God in the lives of our own children and grandchildren, as well as the children and those young in the faith in our church?

Here are a few suggestions:

- ♣ Look at your own life the best way to prove to our children the value and relevance of faith in Christ is to be a living demonstration of that truth. Children learn more from watching us than they do from what we say. If our children see that our walk doesn't match our talk, behaving and speaking in one way at church but living and speaking differently at home or work, they will see through our lack of integrity and perceive that Jesus doesn't make a real difference in our lives. What does your child observe about your attitudes to others, the things you watch or read, the websites you visit, the language you use, the way you react when something goes wrong or when someone annoys you? Try to live out your faith in an authentic and relevant way. Let them see that even though you make mistakes and life gets messy that you can overcome these difficulties with God's help.
- Pray with them and share answers to prayer don't just turn prayer into a shopping list at bedtime but ask them what they would like Gods help with and pray together about those things. When our girls were little we used to pray with them when there were difficulties or when one of us was ill and then they could always see the reality of God as he answered those prayers so they knew that he could be relied upon.
- ➡ Value the church I know of parents whose children have heard them speaking critically about people at the church and their church leadership and then been surprised when they have grown up not wanting anything to do with the church. I have also known parents who have allowed other priorities to take the place of worship such as sports and other leisure activities and then wondered why worship is not a priority to them as they grow older and been disappointed that their grown up children don't remain in the church.

- [⊕] Make sure your children and grandchildren understand that the church, though far from perfect and made of all kinds of people, are the family of God and that they appreciate the importance and priority of meeting together in worship and fellowship.
- **Be outward looking** allow your children to see you being generous with your time, money, home and resources. Encourage them to value all people and to treat people with compassion, kindness and mercy just as Jesus did. Find ways of helping others and try to engage with your community as well as teaching them to have a global view of the world.
- ♣ Look to the future teach the children that God has a good plan for their lives and encourage them to seek God's will for their future jobs, marriage partners, homes and families. Since our girls were born we have prayed for them to find a mighty man of God to marry and are very thankful that they have both married lovely Christian men. Help them so see that the goal of life for a Christian is to walk in obedience to the Lord rather than be dragged along by the goals that the world says is important.

Parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, teachers and friends: you will impact the next generation. What kind of legacy will you leave? God's greatest gift to us is our families. Let each of us make sure we have continued or begun a legacy of faithfulness for our children and grandchildren.

Discipleship at IMC Sunday Evening Meetings in Autumn 2019

In what we now call the Great Commission, Jesus said this, "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you". Discipleship is both 'going out' to spread the good news and 'being together' to grow in our understanding and our practice. Perhaps it's worth saying that going out and being together are designed to enhance each other!

This autumn, our discipleship theme in our 'together time' will be 'Hearing God'. The Sunday evening meeting dates, led by Mark, Phil or Jean, are below and all are at 6:30 pm at IMC.

Listening to God is three evenings on discovering how God speaks to us and gaining confidence in hearing him. We will be looking at how to listen to God for both ourselves and others and will include a time of simple practice each night.

Lectio Divina (Latin for Divine Reading) is an ancient practice dating back to the early Church. In essence, Lectio Divina is a simple way to meet with the Lord, through reflection and prayer, based on the Bible. It does not depend on background knowledge of the Bible, but is a way of allowing God to speak personally to us, through his written word. We shall be working as a group, but you will be able to take this and use it in your personal prayer times.

The topic for the first evening has been left open at the moment.

Why are we running a Toy Swap?

We are running a Toy Swap as part of our mission to serve the local community and be good stewards of the earth.

To reduce our impact on the climate, we need to buy less stuff! Why? Because all stuff uses up resources and requires energy to be made. And we in the developed world are using far more than the planet can provide.

So we'd like to encourage people to give second-hand gifts rather than buy new where possible, which also saves money.

Cambodian Crusade Hangs in the Balance

For nearly a year, Cambodian Christians have been planning and preparing for an evangelistic crusade, originally to be held in mid-November 2019 but subsequently postponed to early December.



With three months to go (at the time of writing this article) before the culmination of the Love Phnom Penh Festival (LPPF), the organisers are still waiting for three crucial decisions from the Cambodian authorities:

- Formal permission from the government for the festival to go ahead.
- An agreement that they can use the largest stadium in Cambodia's capital, Phnom Penh, for the three-day crusade.
- Visas for the crusade speaker, Dr Franklin Graham, President of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, and his team.
- Cambodian Christians urge their brothers and sisters around the world to join them in prayer:

"Please continue to help support and encourage more prayer for LPPF. We believe the focus for LPPF at this time is a breakthrough in any Satanic hindrances and human resistance. Then God's will and purpose for LPPF will be accomplished and be unstoppable."

Please also pray for a major children's outreach planned for October.

Christmas Angels



After last year's amazing success of distributing the angels around lyybridge, the stewards have requested that we 'do' this project again. So, those of you that participated last year perhaps you could start getting those needles out again, and if you didn't then maybe you could get involved this year.

The Aim: To share God's love and to bless the community we live in with a free Christmas decoration that comes with a message of hope at Christmas-time.

The Idea: Knit lots of angel decorations, attach a message of Christmas hope, and in one co-ordinated event leave them in (hopefully) hundreds of locations across our community for people to find (this is known as "yarn bombing").

Where did the idea originate? We got the idea from a friend of mine whose church in Fleet, Hampshire joined in last year (she is Sue Butterfield, who used to live in Ivybridge, so many of you probably know her). However, the idea originally came from the North Shields and Whitley Bay Methodist Circuit near Newcastle. In the past three years they (and churches like ours across the country) have knitted over 70,000 angels, and some of them have turned up as far away as South Africa!

What do we want you to do? Get yourself and your friends knitting angels – we need hundreds of them! Last year we made over 500!

Where do I get a pattern for the angels? There are already hard copies of the knitting pattern available on the noticeboard in the Concourse at church, or you can download an electronic copy from:

We will collect the angels from all you avid knitters (there will be a collection box in the Concourse at church from November onwards), and we'll print and attach the Christmas message labels; then on a date in the few weeks before Christmas we will organise the yarn bombing. If you want to be a part of this, please let us know and we'll rope you in! At the time of writing the exact date for the bombing has not yet been agreed. We will also register our project with the original scheme so that it will be part of this much bigger venture.

2019 Gift Day

As explained in your September Newsletter the selected project for this year is the refurbishment of the Concourse. Any giving over and above that needed for the concourse will be used for other building related projects around the church (of which there is never a shortage!!)

We also believe that the more we give, the more God is generous to us, and this applies to us corporately as a church, as well as to us as individuals. Therefore, we have decided to tithe the gifts received on Gift Day to the All We Can "Hope is Taking Root" Harvest 2019 appeal. All We Can is the Methodist Church's relief and development organisation, and their Harvest appeal this year is targeted at helping poor farming families in Cherkos in Ethiopia by providing them with seeds to plant (especially seed potatoes) and training on how to maximise their crops in the uncertain weather conditions that they face. More details will be shared with you in the services leading up to Harvest Festival.
