
SEPTEMBER 2020 NEWSLETTER




sharing Life Sharing Faith

Dear Magazine Reader

And are we vet alive?

The opening hymn at the annual Methodist Conference begins with the words, 'And are we yet alive, and see each other's face?' This hymn held extra poignancy at



this year's conference as most members were meeting via Zoom and we didn't see each other's faces very much at all!

The question in this verse is a good one to ask ourselves as individuals and as churches. 'And are we yet alive?' These words ★ got me thinking about what it means to be alive. The theme for the Presidential Year 2020-2021 is about growth, personally and corporately, and in order to grow, something, or someone needs to actually be alive!

According to the BBC Bitesize website there characteristics of living organisms and I think they can help us reflect on whether or not we and our churches are alive.

Living organisms have the following characteristics in common:

Movement

The name, the Methodist Movement suggests something that is not standing still. John Wesley didn't intend to leave the Anglican Church but Methodism gradually evolved into a distinct denomination. This pattern has been repeated throughout the history of the Church as groups beginning as a living, moving entity, soon settle and become as set in their ways as the group from which they tried to escape. Wesley is quoted as saying: 'I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist either in Europe or America. But I am afraid lest they should only exist as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the 斄 power.'

Reproduction

A few years ago the Methodist Council recognized that the greatest risk to the church was its inability to reproduce by making new disciples and that the church would cease to exist.

My heart is very much that of an evangelist and I love to encourage people to share their own faith with others. I believe it's possible for ordinary Christians to share the love of Jesus in ways that are not cringy, embarrassing, weird or dogmatic and that we need to learn to be natural in the way we share our faith.

As churches and individuals, do we feel able to naturally share Jesus with others? When was the last time someone became a new Christian in our churches?

★ Sensitivity

Living things have the sensitivity to detect stimuli and respond to them. Often as Christians and as churches we can lack sensitivity to the needs of others and can become so focussed on our own lives and the practical issues around running churches that we can miss the needs of those around us.

A I wonder if as individuals and churches we are inward looking or are we sensitive to those we meet and prepared to listen to their stories and show God's love to them.

★ Growth

Before the lockdown I had the great privilege of visiting the Methodist Church in Brazil where the church is growing at an amazing rate - from 167,000 members in 2010 to a current membership of 275,000 and still growing. The key principles of growth in Brazil are lessons that I believe we need to learn in the church in the UK and I hope to share some of these in the coming months.

Living things naturally grow, so I believe that if our churches are alive and thriving we will see spiritual and numerical growth.

Respiration

As Christians and churches, are we open to the breath of the Holy Spirit to cleanse, energise, empower and enable us to live in a way that brings honour to God and extends his Kingdom on the earth?

Excretion

Often in our churches and our own lives, there are unwanted, waste products that we need to get rid of in order to be healthy. We need to regularly come before God and allow the light of the Holy Spirit to show us where we need to repent and ask for forgiveness so that we don't carry these harmful thoughts, words and deeds and through them cause damage to ourselves, others and the cause of the Gospel.

Nutrition

I'm often astounded by the lack of Bible knowledge within our churches and even amongst some of our leaders and amazed at how few people have actually read the whole Bible during their lives. In Brazil and in churches in other nations I have witnessed a real hunger for the feeding from God's word and I pray for this appetite within our own nation. My prayer is that we will hunger and thirst after righteousness and allow Jesus to have the throne within our own lives and within the lives of our churches.

So these are the seven characteristics of living things and I close with the question with which I began, for your reflection and meditation:

'And are we yet alive?'

The fact is, we may not like some of the things the governments say or do, but for those of us who are Christians we are urged to pray for our rulers and those in authority so, "that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way." (1 Timothy 2:1-2)

There is one true Saviour. No government or politician can save us, but only Jesus Christ. He is loving towards us and has shown it, not just in the pages of the Bible but in the hearts and minds of those who have truly been open to Him. He sees under the masks we wear, not the ones that seek to shield us and others from a virus, but the ones that we place over ourselves because of fear, shame, wrong -doing or spiritual pride. Whilst it is right to obey the authorities on the issue of mask wearing, it would be a tragedy to live life behind any emotional or spiritual masks. God invites us to be open and honest with Him because He loves us and wants to set us free from all that seeks to hold us back from being free in Him.

My name is Lyta from Freedom Church, Phnom Penh, Cambodia. I want to share with you my journey with Jesus.

I was born and raised in a Buddhist family. When I was 18 years old I found out that I had blood cancer. It ruined my life. became full of fear and was hopeless and the hospital became like my home. The doctors said I had only three months to live. My parents tried everything to help me. They took me to hospitals in Thailand and Vietnam. But I was still not better. We worshipped several spirits. We tried Buddhist ceremonies to find healing for me. But nothing helped. Two years later, I was still alive but very sick.

My brother invited me to a home group. That evening, I accepted Jesus as my saviour. The people in the small group prayed for me and I decided to come to church on Sunday. I still remember my first day. I got so much love and encouragement from church people. They welcomed me, hugged me and said, 'There is still hope for you.' I really loved that day. I began to volunteer in church and my leaders gave me the opportunity to lead a team. My life was changing completely. I felt loved and a new confidence. I got leadership skills. When I went to see the doctors again they couldn't find any cancer in me. By faith, I was healed. I was so excited. My family, my parents and people in church celebrated with me.

Meanwhile, I had met my future husband, Visal. He was in that small group that prayed for me. Two years later, when I was 22, we decided to get married. We went to the doctors again to check my health. They said that we were not able to have a baby because of the medicine that I had taken. This was a hard time 🔯 for both of us. We had to choose what the doctors had said or choose to trust God. From then on we saw miracle after miracle. We believed that if God could do it once He could do it again. So we chose to trust God! We prayed and fasted and we never gave up.

At the end of 2019, we felt called by God to plant a church in Phnom Penh. We were really excited for this. At that time I found out that I was pregnant. We were blown away and everyone was celebrating with us. Our miracle daughter Maya is

nine months old. God had healed me and blessed us with a baby. She is so healthy and strong. I can testify that Jesus makes the impossible possible if we trust Him and believe who He says He is. Faith combined with action, faith combined with prayer.

We have survived lock down - and it's been a good, busy and rewarding time. We have also learnt a lot and have adapted many of our systems to cope with regulations and safety.



One thing we have valued immensely is having a team that does the Tesco pick

ups twice a week on a rota. Sadly (also happily) those willing volunteers are now picking up their normal lives again and so we would like to put together a 4 weekly rota to meet this need.

So, one week in four, the team on the rota would pick up from Lee Mill Tesco on a Friday and Wednesday morning (though these days are flexible around the volunteers lives to some extent) and deliver to Church. If said volunteers don't have their own keys to church one of the team will meet you there to unlock. It's generally easier if two people do it - so you need to be aware of households/bubbles but one person can do it if that's the choice.

You will be provided with Food Bank identification and Tesco will have a list of names. We don't often get challenged so its never really a problem.

CHRISTMAS ANGELS

Yes, it's that time of year again – the start of the great 'Christmas Angel Knitting' marathon! Originally, last year was going to be the last, however due to the effects of coronavirus, I thought that Ivybridge will be in even more need of blessing

over the Christmas period. So, all you lovely 'knitters', it's time to get those knitting needles clicking again!! Let's see if we, as a church, can in some small way bless as many people as possible in our community this Christmas.

The Aim: To share God's love and to bless the community we live in with a free Christmas decoration that comes with a message of hope at Christmas-time.

The Idea: Knit lots of angel decorations, attach a message of Christmas hope, and in one coordinated event leave them in (hopefully) hundreds of locations across our community for people to find (this is known as "yarn bombing").

Where did the idea originate? We got the idea from a friend of mine whose church in Fleet in Hampshire joined in last year (she is Sue Butterfield, who used to live in Ivybridge, so many of you probably know her). However, the idea originally came from the North Shields and Whitley Bay Methodist Circuit near Newcastle. In the past three years they (and churches like ours across the country) have knitted over 90,000 angels, and some of them have turned up as far away as South Africa!

What do we want you to do? Get yourself and your friends knitting angels – we need hundreds of them! (Last year we made over 600!).

Where do I get a pattern for the angels? There are already hard copies of the knitting pattern available on the noticeboard in the Concourse at church, or you can download an electronic copy

What will we do? We will collect the angels from all you avid knitters (there will be a collection box in the Concourse at church from November onwards), and we'll print and attach the Christmas message labels; then on a date in the few weeks before Christmas we will organise the yarn bombing (if you want to be a part of this, please let us know and we'll rope you in). At the time of writing the exact date for the bombing has not yet been agreed.
