IMC's New Electric Supplier

From the 1st January 2021 IMC's new electric supplier will be Good Energy. This energy supplier sources all its electric from renewable energy within the UK. This is either from the sun, wind, water and biogeneration. Therefore we are directly supporting the environment and the UK's energy industry.

Good Energy's fuel mix is made up as follows:

53.9% wind

28.4% biogeneration

13.4% solar4.3% hydro

Good Energy own six solar and two wind farms, which generates sufficient power for 18,000 homes. They then source directly from other renewable generators the balance they require to cover what they sell. An example is from Westermost Rough Wind Farm situated in the North Sea, five miles off the Yorkshire Coast north of Hull. To find out more, google Westermost Rough Wind Farm and I suggest reading the Wikepedia review.



What is biogeneration? This information is taken from the Good Energy website.

Bioenergy refers to electricity and gas that is generated from organic matter, known as biomass. This can be anything from plants and timber to agricultural and food waste – and even sewage. The term bioenergy also covers transport fuels produced from organic matter. But on this page, we're just focusing on how it's used to generate electricity and carbon neutral gas.



How does biomass generate energy? When biomass is used as an energy source, it's referred to as 'feedstock'. Feedstocks can be grown specifically for their energy content (an

energy crop), or they can be made up of waste products from industries such as agriculture, food processing or timber production. Dry, combustible feedstocks such as wood pellets are burnt in boilers or furnaces. This in turn boils water and creates steam, which drives a turbine to generate electricity.

Wet feedstocks, like food waste for example, are put into sealed tanks where they rot and produce methane gas (also called biogas). The gas can be captured and burnt to generate electricity. Or it can be injected into the national gas grid and be used for cooking and heating. Bioenergy is a very flexible energy source. It can be turned up and down quickly to meet demand, making it a great backup for weather-dependent renewable technologies such as wind and solar.

Is bioenergy environmentally friendly and sustainable? Burning biomass does release carbon dioxide. But, because it releases the same amount of carbon that the organic matter used to produce it absorbed while it grew, it doesn't break the carbon balance of the atmosphere. In comparison, burning fossil fuels releases carbon dioxide that has been locked away for millions of years, from a time when the earth's atmosphere was very different. This adds more carbon dioxide into our current atmosphere, breaking the carbon balance. The overall sustainability and environmental benefits of bioenergy can depend on whether waste feedstocks or energy crops are being used.

Waste feedstocks

Waste biomass gives off gases naturally when it rots. If this happens in a place where there's no oxygen, such as food waste buried deep within landfill, it can generate methane which is a much stronger greenhouse gas than carbon dioxide. Instead of allowing methane to vent into the atmosphere, breaking it down in a sealed tank allows it to be captured and burnt. Burning methane leaves you with carbon dioxide and water, which are better for the environment.

Energy crops

Energy crops are grown specifically for generating energy. So, unlike capturing methane from waste, there isn't an argument that burning them reduces greenhouse gases which would have been given off anyway. However, energy crops can still be low carbon if they are managed sustainably. For example, when energy crops are burnt,

equivalent crops should be planted that will absorb the same amount of carbon that was released by burning.

Does Good Energy use bioenergy? Yes. 20% of our renewable electricity is from biogeneration and 6% of the gas we supply is biomethane (this will be 10% from 1st April 2020). Our biogeneration procurement policy makes sure that we only contract with bioenergy generators that have sustainable and responsible generation practices.

To keep our energy supply as clean and ethical as possible, we only source bioenergy that meets the following requirements:

It must come from waste or sustainable sources

Land must be used sustainably, respecting natural habitats and biodiversity

Energy crops must not impact food production

Animal welfare must be respected


Transportation of biofuels should be minimised

Biofuel generators should be highly efficient and able to put waste heat to good use

Impacts on air quality must be appropriately managed

Green Gas must be certified under the Green Gas Certification Scheme

Why was IMC's gas not switched to renewable? The sourcing of renewable gas is possible, but the availability is limited and therefore makes it much more expensive. Hopefully as energy generation changes IMC will be able to make a further change with gas.



IMC Financial Status end 2020

2020 has been a challenging year, as we can all testify to. What has been more amazing though, is God's provision through the unmistakable generosity of His people during this year. Your faithfulness is His faithfulness.

This has meant that IMC has been able to focus on its mission without financial concern; for which we praise the Lord. This has also enabled the church fellowship to continue to give generously by its tithing and more.

The church finances at the end of 2020 are in a healthy state. The forecast for the end of the Methodist Church financial year (end August 2021), after deducting the required church reserve, is an unallocated account balance of £19,000.

Encouraged by this financial strength we are spending money wisely for the needs of the church. The heating is the current focus, with three heaters being replaced and a fourth due to be replaced. The cost of all these heaters, repairs and adding remote controls to enable switching the heating on a few hours before a church service, is now nearing £14,000.

IMC has also invested in Livestreaming to improve the quality and make more accessible our services via YouTube. This is costing nearly £9,500. The recent quinquennial survey has identified that the flat roof over the cafe needs repairing and this is estimated at £10,000. Chris Phillips and the property team will also be getting quotes in the New Year for the flat roof and some pointing work on the external Sanctuary wall.

So far, IMC has been able to meet these costs. The current thought for the 2021 New Year's Gift Day is an appeal for support for the heating costs.

We should look forward to 2021, knowing that God's faithfulness through his people in 2020 has been immense and that the testimony of His love for his people and for the Ivybridge community is freely available and overcomes all things.

At KE434 we are really praying as a church that our faithful God intervenes in all our situations because nothing is beyond Him. The pandemic has brought several families down economically. The small businesses they had collapsed. We have been blessed to empower a few to restart their businesses with the resources that the lord has provided. We are still trusting God to bring more back to their businesses.

Part of our beneficiaries come from the KANO PLAINS. With the prolonged rains experienced this year and still ongoing, several houses have been affected structurally since most of them are mud houses. Its our prayer that the rains tone down.

During our campaigns to sensitize our caregivers and the community at large on the importance of COVID-19 containment measures. We've met families who are struggling to spend time together because of the Lockdown.

Struggling to put both ends meet has for along time denied them this warmth of family fellowship. We are praying that this state of families being together and knowing and understanding one another be a blessing that has come to stay.

Our young boys and girls are in danger being derailed because of the prevailing circumstances. There is a rise in pregnancies and substance abuse amongst teenagers all around us. We thank God that as KE434,the Lord has not allowed this in our children. It's our prayer that the Good Lord continues to Prevail.

The most immediate remedies that we are now working on is instituting skills training environment within the center to engage our youths who are out of school as at now to acquire practical skills like BAKING, Kitchen GARDENS and AUDIO RECORDING STUDIO. This is to nurture and develop their talents and to disciple them to keep them away from being swallowed by the evil wave that's blowing now.

We are really trusting God to equip for us a WOODWORK WORK-SHOP and METALWORK WORKSHOP with the basic tools required to train our boys and girls and even some of our caregivers. This is able to turn them into very serious skilled personnel and employers.

May our good Lord richly bless you as a family of believers and secure you divinely. Pass our deep love to the entire family of believers. We feel the love of God that you have for us as Key to Life church.

Releasing children from poverty in Jesus' name

Cambodia 2021: Great is Your Faithfulness

Thank you to all in IMC for your support of Cambodian Communities out of Crisis (CCC) and your prayers for Cambodia in 2020. What are some of the challenges that the country and CCC may face in 2021?

Covid-19: Until the end of November, all the cases notified (officially—no one knows whether the true picture has been different) were travellers entering the country. Since then, there has been a small community outbreak. Church meetings are limited to 20 persons. Please pray that Cambodia's infection rate may remain low.

Freedom: The Prime Minister has boasted that one in every five people in online discussion groups reports to him. Many Cambodians are very careful about what they say in public. Please pray for freedom of expression and for a viable opposition to hold the government to account.

Poverty: Cambodia's tourism and garment production industries have not yet started to recover from shutdowns caused by the pandemic. One in five garment workers is reported to be experiencing hunger on a daily basis. Please pray that the slow improvement in the standard of living of the poor may resume and accelerate.



Village outreach: CCC's mission to preach the gospel and serve the poor in a small village just outside Phnom Penh was set back by Covid-19 restrictions and precautions in 2020. Please pray for our small but faith-filled team of ladies to be prepared and equipped so that they are ready to launch into action once the Lord opens the door for them.

Education: Studying online has not been easy for the group of children whose education CCC sponsors. Unreliable Internet connections and pressures on working parents have hindered their learning. Please pray that in 2021 uninterrupted on-campus learning may resume.

Our local prisons do need our prayer, it has been a challenging time with many normal activities cancelled and without the support of local volunteers.

IMC Now a Registered Charity - 1192612

The church has always been a charity even before registration. The change is a result of IMC's income, which includes the Youth Vision Fund, being above £100,000 per annum.

The charity law states, that once a church's income exceeds this threshold, they are legally bound to register with the Charity Commission. The registration was completed on line by Val Marriott and Robin Duckering in two Zoom sessions lasting



just over 5 hours. Clearly, if we had done this a few times before we could have reduced this time considerably! We were very blessed to have some helpful notes from the central Methodist Church to guide us, plus Val's in depth IMC knowledge.

Before registration, IMC operated as a charity under a Statutory Instrument 2014, No. 242 that relates particularly to churches, in that if their income is below £100,000 per year then they are 'excepted charities' and do not need to register with the charity commission. Before registration IMC made its gift aid claim via the central Methodist Church, with many other Methodist Churches using a combined gift aid number. This will now change, with IMC making its gift aid claim directly. IMC is in the process of registering with HMRC for its own gift aid number.

With registration, the trustees of IMC will now have to legally submit an annual report, that has to cover certain aspects of its charitable purposes and including its financial accounts each year. The purpose of this reporting is transparency and accountability to the general public. Examples of these reports can be found on the Charity Commission website.

If you search the charity register, using just 'Methodist' it returns 1,892 registrations! I actually found this encouraging, that if you said on average each church has say only 100 members, then that is 189,200 believers. I am sure though there are many more.

The IMC leaders are reviewing the obligations for reporting each year and will be making some recommendations to the Church Council some time in the New Year.
