

Vitamin F This is so true!!!!

Why do I have a variety of friends who are all so different in character? How is it possible that I can get along with them all? I think that each one helps to bring out a "different" part of me. With one of them I am polite. With another I joke.

IMC BANK ACCOUNT CHANGE

IMC now has a new Coop Community bank account and the existing IMC NatWest account will be closed on the 19th May 2021.

The background to the new Coop bank account.

This change started when I became treasurer in March 2020, just as the UK entered its first lockdown. Paying church bills by cheque requires two signatures and during a lockdown this did not seem to be the right way to proceed or practical.

The leadership team and the church council therefore agreed to move to online banking with the IMC NatWest account. The downside of this move is that we lost the two-signature authorisation for payments, as online transactions only required the treasurer to approve. This is not good practice. NatWest did offer a dual authorisation account, but at a cost.

Then in August 2020 the NatWest bank wrote to IMC about the possibility of switching its bank account under a scheme called the "Banking Business Switch Offer". This arose from the merger of NatWest and RBS, who would end up with an unacceptable large proportion of the UK business accounts. For the merger to be approved, they agreed with the UK government that they would divest some of their business accounts. In addition, if our application was successful, this could also possibly attract a £4000 incentive payment for switching.

In exploring this option, IMC decided to apply for a Coop Community Directplus Account, as it offers two-signature authorisation online with no fees. The other advantage is the Coop bank is considered to be ethical and also uses the post office network, which is easily accessible. IMC applied on the 3rd December 2020 and received approval from RBS on the 22nd March 2021. IMC then received a formal notice from the Coop Bank for its new account on the 24th March 2021.

What happens next?

The main change is for all IMC's faithful donors who either give by a regular standing order and or make one off gifts.

If you do nothing your regular weekly and monthly donations will continue to be received by IMC. The NatWest bank will transfer them to the IMC Coop bank account. This is for an indefinite period.

If you want to make a change to the amount of your standing order you will have to cancel your old standing order and set up a new standing order using the new IMC Coop Bank details.

If you want to make a one off donation to IMC you should start using the new Coop account immediately.

The bank will write to each donor advising of this change. I have not seen the letter. It is likely though, that they will ask you to change your standing order from IMC NatWest to IMC Coop.

For those who have online access this change is relatively straightforward to do.

For those who do not have online banking access and want to make the change, it will involve writing to your bank to cancel the old standing order and starting a new one with the new IMC Coop bank details. IMC can provide a standing order mandate form for you to use. Please request from either David or myself, Robin.

In addition to this article I will email or post this article to every donor about this change, just to ensure no one is missed. In addition the standing order mandate form will be attached/enclosed that can be used as an instruction to your bank/building society to close the old standing order and set up a new one.

ALBANIA REPORT for Methodist Financial Year 2019/2020 from Nick & Sar Wakeley

During the period between 01/09/2019 and 31/08/2020 a total of £4,863.75 was given by the Ivybridge Methodist Church fellowship to support our ministry in Albania. Of this sum £1,263.75 was to support the purchase of food.

Our relationship with IMC began over twenty years ago with the idea to "twin" the church we pastored in Elbasan with IMC.

Since that time IMC supported the church with a regular monthly gift towards the running expenses of the church to cover things such as rent and electricity etc.

Seven years ago we handed over the church and began a church planting ministry in villages. At that time IMC very kindly agreed to transfer the support to cover our living and ministry expenses.

We also have longstanding friends who fellowship at IMC who have supported us as a family for over thirty years.

Then latterly we receive a regular gift into our Aid & Church account to go towards our ministry of feeding needy families.

Ministry Report

(i) Discipleship Groups:

The main aim of our ministry is to make disciples, (Mat 28:19).

So our principal focus is on discipleship groups in four locations. Two groups are mixed male and female. Two groups are ladies and children only. There are also separate children's meetings in the two locations of mixed meetings. Hence a total of six meetings each week.

During the time of lock-down we held weekly meetings online.

(ii) Practical Helps Ministries

We aim to show the love of God in practical ways, such as:

* Food

During the lock-down we were able to transfer money to super-markets so needy people could buy food on providing proof of identity.

The gift from IMC was very timely and spent in this way. We were able to support nearly thirty families some more than once.

* Education & Training

Help to sponsor university and elementary education. Also training such as getting an HGV license and a welding course.

* Medical & Dental Expenses

During this time we were also able to raise money to buy a simple house for a very poor lady who was living in a shack and whose husband had been in prison for many years.

(iii) Teaching & Teaching Materials

Itinerant preaching was limited because of travel restrictions, some teachings were posted on social media. Also preparation of new material continued.

(iv) Encouraging Leaders & their Wives

Before lock-down we met with church leaders, often with their wives, usually over a meal or a coffee. This is simply to encourage them. We see it as friendship without an agenda! During this time much of this has continued by phone.

(v) Hosting Teams

We were unable to host teams during this time due to restrictions.

(vi) Children's Camp

However we were able to host our annual children's camp at our house. We collected some children from villages and children from our village came on foot.

(vii) Ladies' Nights of Prayer

These continued some of the time, sometimes with Bible teaching included.

We hope this gives a flavour of the ministry we believe God has entrusted to us and we really want to thank all at IMC for their faithful support to us over the years.

Spiritual Gifts

Last month, we looked at the importance of Spiritual Gifts in the Church and how the Church functions more effectively when everyone is released into their God-given purpose. This month, we continue by looking at what spiritual gifts are and how they differ (e.g.) from other spiritual aspects, like the Fruit of the Spirit.

There are many scriptures that speak about our purpose in life, e.g.

Ps 139: 13-16 tells us we are unique: each a one-off!

Eph 2: 10 says we are here for a purpose

Acts 17: 26 reminds us we were born at the right time and in the right place

Esther 4: 14 points to our Godly potential for influencing the circumstances we are in

The Holy Spirit has given us gifts to enable us to carry out our God-given purpose. This is not random: God knows us perfectly and made us with these abilities built in. Becoming a Christian and allowing the Spirit free rein in our lives, releases the gifts for us to use.

So, what is a spiritual gift: A spiritual gift is a special ability, given by the Holy Spirit according to God's grace, to every member of the Body of Christ for use in and outside that Body. You might like to reflect on the various parts of this definition.

We also use the word Calling. In general, our calling is to use our gifts – i.e. God does not give you a gift to bury in the ground, but to use to build his Kingdom. But, he may well call you to use your gift in a specific way – sometimes called a Ministry – minister, by the way, is a simple word, meaning servant. God has not only given us gifts, but also passions for certain things. Like gifts, that differs from one person to another. A person with a pastoral gift, might well have a burning passion to tell young people about Jesus. Their gift is pastoral or nurturing, but the application of the gift is to a certain group of people.

The bible identifies about 30 spiritual gifts, but we need not argue about the exact number. One thing is for sure, though. The gifts are spread around the Body of Christ and so, everyone will be in a minority, but at the same time, everyone is vital to the success of the whole. And, because we are all in a minority, not everyone will be excited about the same things as other people! The point is, we make an unstoppable force together.



Most of us have a few gifts each; for example, a leader will often have the gift of faith as well, because leadership can be scary and faith strengthens us when the road gets hard. Gifts often go together in this way. A Teacher would not be effective without Knowledge, so those gifts often go together

Natural gifts are not the same as spiritual gifts, though very often God takes a natural gift, e.g. the gift of serving, and uses it spiritually (to serve his purposes). Spiritual gifts will always build the Kingdom of God (or the Body of Christ)

Gifts of the Spirit and the Fruit of the Spirit are not the same, but complementary. The fruit of the Spirit (as in Galatians 5: 22/23) is about our character and how we grow this fruit when we listen and learn from the Holy Spirit. Without character, gifts are ineffective if not dangerous. If we don't have a Christian character, why would anyone listen to our teaching or our prophetic voice or anything else?

Finally, the tasks we do in church should ideally match the gifts we have. This is not a rigid rule! All Christians are asked to intercede, but some people are strongly gifted that way and have a deep passion to intercede for others and world issues. Some Christians make their home and goods readily available to others as a matter of habit, but all of us are asked to be hospitable. Again, the key is passion for something.

I'd like to invite you to review your life and look at the various things you do, where you do them and, if you can, see what you bring to the situation. For example, during a typical week, you might spend time at work, with your friends, with your family and in church. Reflect on what you do at those times and what you bring to the situation.

If you'd like to look at this further, we have an excellent questionnaire to help discover your gifts. It takes about 30 minutes to complete and is a good starting point for discovery and reflection. It is, of course, only a first step, not the destination! The results will give you something to ponder and pray about, to see where God might lead you. If you send me an email, I'll send you a copy.
