

POEMS for FAITH December, 2021

Bio

John Donne (1572-1631) was a soldier (he fought with Sir Walter Raleigh), a Member of Parliament (for Brackley/Taunton), an Anglican priest (finally becoming Dean of St Paul's Cathedral) and, of course, one of the greatest English poets.

Background

This month's offering is a rhyming sonnet. One of seven sonnets collectively known as 'La Corona' (The Crown). Together they cover the life of Christ from His Annunciation to His Ascension. In the third of these entitled 'Nativity' Donne touches on the gestating Jesus, His exclusion from an inn to stall, the Star and Wise Men, Herod and escape to Egypt.

It might help us to think of the poem in two parts. The first eight lines deal with Donne addressing Mary, and the second six lines beginning 'Seest thou, my soul' deal with the poet's own faith as it is impacted by the infant Jesus. I also suggest this poem repays at least three slow readings.

Poem

Immensity cloistered in thy dear womb, Now leaves His well-belov'd imprisonment, There He hath made Himself to His intent Weak enough, now into the world to come; But O, for thee, for Him, hath the inn no room? Yet lay Him in this stall, and from the Orient, Stars and wise men will travel to prevent The effect of Herod's jealous general doom. Seest thou, my soul, with thy faith's eyes, how He Which fills all place, yet none holds Him, doth lie? Was not His pity towards thee wondrous high, That would have need to be pitied by thee? Reflection

Take time to quietly meditate on Donne's idea of the bigness of God being laid in Mary's womb — of Him Who is everywhere contained in a manger. To you, is this wonderful or simply absurd? Donne also speaks of Jesus's time in Mary's womb as a 'well belov'd imprisonment', where He chose to become 'weak enough' before entering our world. What do you think about these poetic ideas? And finally, how would you feel about kissing Jesus and going with Him into Egypt, fleeing for your life — an asylum seeker from harm?

Action

- (1) Pray for persecuted Christians in places like Eritrea, Sudan and Syria who feel the need to flee their nations.
- (2) In the past, Amanda and I have been able to support asylum seekers who have escaped countries such as North Korea, Iraq and Afghanistan. Are there any asylum seekers you may support in your local area?
- (3) Consider becoming more informed about persecuted Christians worldwide by joining organisations like 'Open Doors' or 'Release International'.

Dear Ivybridge Methodist Church

I just wanted to say thank you to you all for your incredibly generous donation of £931.35.

In regards to COVID we would appreciate your prayers that vaccinations are processed for families of our sponsored children. I have put something below which may give you some more ideas on how things are in the countries we are serving in. We have been given an amazing £1,191,058 to our COVID fund for which we give thanks with all our heart. What an amazing gift. Compassion is monitoring the vaccine development, availability, and approval in each country where we work.

We understand that the vaccine will be available for citizens in our field countries starting from this year (2021). Most countries plan to provide vaccinations to their citizens free of charge as supply becomes available. However, vaccine trials for children under the age of 12 have not yet been fully completed. Therefore, we do not expect COVID-19 vaccinations for children under the age of 12, including children in our programme, to be available until later in 2021 at the earliest.

Our church partners may provide non-monetary support to those we serve who wish to get vaccinated though, for example by arranging transport to a vaccination site or by providing education resources. The availability of vaccine supply varies greatly across our field countries. As more vaccines are approved and more funding is secured for low-income countries' vaccination programmes, we anticipate the availability of opportunities to get vaccinated to increase. We understand that there are some concerns that untested or unproven vaccines may be offered and used in lower income countries. We are continually monitoring the efforts of the World Health Organization, their international partners, and reputable vaccine manufacturers to bring approved and safe vaccines to these countries, including those where

we work. We are working to educate those we serve on the importance of vaccine safety and approval. We are encouraging those that are interested in being vaccinated to get a vaccine that has been approved for safety and efficacy by a reputable regulatory agency and only from reputable healthcare agencies. I hope this helps. If there is anything else we can do to help please do let us know. God bless you and thank you again.

COMPASSION UK – Letter writing

The art of lettering writing seems old fashioned, but I believe it can actually carry the gift of life.

Psalm chapter 10 verse 17 says: "You, Lord, hear the desire of the afflicted; you encourage them, and you listen to their cry."

And how does the Lord encourage us? Through His word, the blessing of the Spirit and by fellowship, this is how we interact with each other.

I was prompted to write this article, when I unexpectedly received a 'phone call from Jenny who works for Compassion UK responding to IMC's generous Easter Appeal gift.

At some point in our conversation, Jenny began to explain that Compassion are contacting sponsors who have not written to their children in over 2 to 3 years. We both agreed that while the financial support is important for the children, it is that regular word of encouragement from someone who believes in them that makes the financial contribution truly valuable. She suggested that sponsors should write a minimum of two letters a year, but ideally four.

George W Bush, President of the USA sponsored a child through Compassion under a pseudonym and in his first letter wrote: "Dear Timothy, I want to be your pen pal," he then went onto write "I am an old man, 77 years old, but I love kids; and though we have not met I love you already," and then "I live in Texas – I will write you from time to time – Good Luck."Interestingly George W Bush corresponded with Timothy for 10 years and Timothy only discovered the true identity of his sponsor many years later. Encouragement is widely acknowledged as a critical factor for life and even for building successful companies. Gallup's question 6 (of 12) that has been used as an organisational development tool around the world is interesting. I quote, 'There is someone at work who encourages my development.'

I Thessalonians chapter 5 verse 11 Paul says: "Therefore encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing."

Without our Saviours love, usually expressed through His people, where would each of us be?
