POEMS for FAITH January, 2022

Bio

William Butler Yeats (1865-1939) was an Irish poet who in 1923 won the Nobel Prize in Literature for his deeply symbolic and imagerical writings. Though he had a grand and great-grandfather who were Church of Ireland clergymen he became interested in the occult. However, in later years, as a member of the Irish Senate he took a stand in debates for Protestant ideals.

Background

As we are in the season of Epiphany, I have chosen the short, eight-line, poem below. 'The Magi' was composed in 1914 while Yeats was staying in Bloomsbury, London. It pictures the 'kings' continuously travelling from the confusion of Calvary to try and rediscover the satisfying mystery of the Manger scene.

Poem

Now as at all times I can see in the mind's eye, In their stiff, painted clothes, the pale unsatisfied ones Appear and disappear in the blue depth of the sky With all their ancient faces like rain-beaten stones, And all their helms of silver hovering side by side, And all their eyes still fixed, hoping to find once more, Being by Calvary's turbulence unsatisfied, The uncontrollable mystery on the bestial floor.

Reflection

Which is your most favourite line of the poem and why? Like the Magi, are you fulfilled more by the Manger than the Cross? If so why, if not, why not? Or are both scenes from the life of Christ similarly important to your faith?

Action

Our family has always celebrated Epiphany. The kids loved getting presents again, after all their friends had finished with Christmas! It started in a small way, but grew across the years. I thought I'd share a couple of things we do together, to spark some of your own ideas and creativity!

Firstly, for those not so sure, Epiphany is also known as Three Kings' Day and is a Christian festival which starts on 6 January. It is a special date in the Christmas story as it's when people celebrate how a star led the Magi - also known as the Three kings or the Wise Men - to visit the baby Jesus after He had been born.

'Epiphany' actually comes from the Greek word meaning 'to reveal', as it is when the baby Jesus was 'revealed' to the world (this is why you might hear people say they've had an epiphany, when they've just realised something!).

So what do we do?

Well, we keep all the 'king' figures from our nativity sets and put them out on display. We also have candles in star shapes which we light. And in true Magi fashion, we give presents to each other. Craft ideas abound – there are crowns, camels, kings and stars to make and decorate. Baking is also an important part of the celebration, with star spicy biscuits and an Epiphany Cake that I make each year. What makes this special is hidden inside the cake is a 'feve' – a little figurine or bean, and whoever finds this in their slice of cake becomes king (or queen) for the rest of the day! Our children used to milk this for all it was worth!

Payday Loans, Cambodia-Style

As Cambodia began to emerge from the deprivation brought upon the country by civil war, genocide and international isolation, various organisations sought to stimulate the economy and improve standards of living by providing so-called microloans. Individuals were able to borrow money easily against collateral in the form of the title deeds of the land on which their homes were built and, in many cases, on which they subsisted by growing rice and keeping a few animals.

Now, what was formerly a humanitarian aid project has become a multibillion dollar business. Cambodia has the most overindebted microfinance sector in the world. By the end of 2020, the average microloan in Cambodia was nearly four times as large as the median annual income. There are more than 2.7 million microloans spread across Cambodia's 4 million households, and most of these loans are collateralised with borrowers' land titles, putting land ownership at risk.

This means the inability to make microloan repayments can result in coerced land sales, robbing Cambodian families of their most precious asset. Even if a small percentage of loans result in such sales, it will irreparably harm hundreds of thousands of families.

Nilay Pilorge, director of Cambodian human rights organisation LICADHO, claims, 'The big nine banks and microfinance institutions, which together control about 90% of Cambodia's microloan market, collected more interest in 2020 compared to the year before. Eight of the nine posted record profits last year, baffling those of us who were seeing more and more borrowers struggling to repay their debts. While many Cambodians are drowning in debts they cannot afford, their creditors are swimming in cash.'

Cases of coerced land sales, child labour and even debt-driven suicides were documented prior to the pandemic, but they are becoming increasingly frequent as the economic situation deteriorates.

A Better Way?

Cambodian Communities out of Crisis (CCC) has no wish to exacerbate this problem, but we have been seeking the Lord about whether He wants us to make small interest-free loans in order to help a few individuals develop sustainable one-person or one-family businesses. We realise there could be risks: borrowers might not be able to repay their loans; unscrupulous

people might take the money and run. But Jesus did say, 'If you lend to those from whom you expect to receive, what credit is that to you? ... Do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return....'

Our first exploration into this possibility, to assist a disabled television repairer to buy equipment, did not lead to our making a loan to him as his circumstances had changed, but it did give our team the opportunity to visit him and his children (he is a widower), pray for them and make a love gift to them.

Please pray:

- † on the large scale, for a solution to Cambodia's indebtedness problem;
- on the small scale, for the Lord's leading of CCC as we consider this possibility further, that if this is His will for us He would lead us to people in genuine need whom He wishes to bless in this way.
